What is a Smartphone?

A mini-computer that makes calls, texts, and does more.

Parts of a Smartphone:

- Screen: Touch-sensitive surface.
- Buttons: Power, volume, and home button (if present).
- Camera: Front and back.

Basic Terms:

- App: A program you use.
- Wi-Fi: Wireless internet.
- Battery Life: How long the phone works before charging.

- Demonstrate how to turn the phone on/off.
- Show how to adjust the volume and brightness.

Making a Call:

- Open the phone app.
- Tap the keypad or select a contact.
- Press the green call button.

Sending a Text Message:

- Open the messages app.
- Type the recipient's name or number.
- Write your message and press "Send."

- Role-play with a participant to make a call.
- Show how to check missed calls and messages.

Connecting to Wifi:

- Open settings and select "Wi-Fi."
- Choose your network and enter the password.
- Wifi Icon when you are connected

Using an App:

- Apps are like tools for specific tasks.
- Example: Open a weather app to check today's forecast.

Downloading an App:

- Open the app store (Apple or Google).
- Search for an app like "Google Maps."
- Tap "Download" or "Install."

- Show a simple app like the flashlight.
- Explain that apps are safe to download if they're from the official store.

Opening the Camera App:

Tap the camera icon.

Taking a Photo:

- Point the camera at your subject.
- Tap the button on the screen or press a physical button (if available).

Recording a Video:

- Switch to video mode.
- Tap the record button.

Finding Photos:

• Open the gallery or photos app.

- Practice taking a photo as a group.
- Show how to delete a photo and take another

Password Safety:

- Create strong passwords.
- Don't share passwords with others.

Avoiding Scams:

- Be cautious of emails or texts asking for personal information.
- Don't click on unknown links.

Updating Your Phone:

Keep software updated to stay secure.

- Share common scam examples, like fake Amazon messages.
- Encourage questions about safety concerns.
